## CIRCULAR NO. 15/89.

Sub: - Forest Department - Maintenance of Forest boundaries with the prescribed size of Cairns and out lines - instructions - Regarding.

According to the standing instructions and the practice followed, all the forest block boundaries are required to be maintained with out lines and prescribed specification size of cairns. The boundaries and cairns are also to be periodically maintained with well defined aignboards wherever required But due to efflux of time, paucity of funds and also due to lack of attention on the party of field staff, the boundaries our Reserve Forests are in a state of dercliction and therefore not visible on the ground. This is a serious situation and needs immediate attention. I have a reason to believe that adquate field inspections are not being carried out at various levels:

Instances have come to notice of this office, that due to improper maintenance of the Forest block boundaries by the concerned officers of the Department encroachments took place, in the past and continue to take place even now. In certain cases even the Revenue Department granted pattas in the block areas and cur staff are totally obvious of the fact. When detected and pointed-laout they are forwarding the plea that these had happend due to lack of clear out forest boundary demarcation with cairns. This type of lapse on the part of Forest Guards, section Officers, Range Officers/Divnl.Forest Officers is leading to all type of complications and confusion of the present day problems faced by the Department in the matter of encroachment grant of irregular pattas etc. thereby placing the Department in a very awkward positions. Hence all the Conservator of Forests/Divnl. Forest Officers are requested to see that Forest block boundaries of their respective divisions are first got inspected and properly maintained to the required width of out lines i.e., not less than 5.50 Mts. for black external boundaries and 2.75 Mts. for enclosure and internal block boundary. The Forest boundary pillars will of course mark the actual limits of the Reserve Forest as notified and should be placed on the outer edge of the clearned line. The pillars should be visible from one to the other and in case where the turning points of boundary are too for so as to render them not easily visible intermediate cairns or pillars should be erected. As a rule boundary pillars should not be more than 200 Mtrs. apart and free from any tree or shrub growth with the prescribed size of cairs. The cairns will be built round the post of the largest stones procurable upto a hieght of 1.25 Mts. and should be 1.25 Mts. in diametre of square at the base and 3/4 mts. at top. In the localities where stone slabs or momoliths are cheaply and easily procurable locally they may take adventage of the same to be used for boundary pillars. The should stand 1/2 mts. above the ground and he strong enough to prevent their being removed by people or broken off by cattle rubbing against them.

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Where masonry pillars are considered reasible they may be constructed adopting the specifications provided for pairns. Specimen figures are attached to the Circular. The cairns.

Specimen figures are attached to the Circular. The cairns and pillars also should be numbered as per the notification, white washed periodically and maintained wall so that the public or other departmental Officers who happen to visit these areas would easily identify the Forest limits. The Divisional Forest Officers also should arrange to display sign Boards with the name of Forest Block, Divisions etc., Joth in Regional Language English and for the guidance of the public in all important places particularly at the point if entry and exit of public right of ways. The conservator of Forests should make it a point to inspect the Forest block boundaries, cairns, sign boards etc., during their inspections in the divisions and see that they are properly maintained and they confirm to the specification given in the relevant provisions of Forest Manual Hand Book. The Divisional Forest Officers should make the Range Officers personally responsible for the proper maintenance of Forest block boundaries, Cairns and sign boards etc., coupled with beat inspections and should initiate drastic action against the concerned Range Officer for any lopses. They should also bring this to the nitice of the concerned field staff for immediate action.

The Conservator of Forests and Divisional Forest Officers should acknowledge the receipt of this circular by return post.
